





After breakfast disembarkement

Porto Rotondo is on the northeast coast of Sardinia, near Mount Ladu. Its name, translated literally means "round port", is due to the natural inlet where the beach town was developed, delineating a practically perfect circle. Built in harmony with its surroundings, Porto Rotondo is harmoniously balanced on the sea, with stunning land and seascapes. In the summer months, the colours and atmosphere must be experienced to be believed. The sea is turquoise, beaches the finest and whitest, the Mediterranean vegetation, or maquis, is perfumed and provides a contrast to the many blues of the sky and water.

Every sunrise and sunset should be seen, either with an early morning swim or with an aperitif in the evening. Porto Rotondo is also a destination for the world's artists, luxury sunseekers and celebrities from the world of sport, cinema and fashion. Nightlife is as exciting or as peaceful as each visitor desires, and the local restaurants superlative, although for a robust budget.

Yachts are moored in the marina, and the central square, Piazzetta San Marco, is in the heart of the village and has many boutiques and bars. An amphitheatre built of local granite is a recommended landmark, as well as the church of San Lorenzo, designed by the renowned architect, Andrea Cascella, with its rare collection of 200 wooden statues.







PORTO CERVO

Porto Cervo, in the hamlet of Arzachena, is the symbol of luxury vacations in Sardinia, where hotels offer amazing suites of hundreds of square meters. Porto Cervo Marina is also one of the biggest tourist ports of the Mediterranean Sea.

It was created in the '60s by Prince Karim Aga Khan, who was fascinated by the beauty of this stretch of Gallura and decided to create the Costa Smeralda Consortium, with the aim to increase and enhance the natural beauty of the territory

Porto Cervo is located at the southern and eastern shore of the natural port, where there are shops, a newsagent, bars, restaurants and supermarkets. The other shores of the bay boast the old and the new marina. At the later is the club house of the exclusive Yacht Club Costa Smeralda. The end of the new marina holds a shipyard capable of repairing large luxury yachts.

In a study released by the European luxury real estate

brokerage Engel & Völkers, Romazzino Bay in Porto Cervo is the most expensive location in Europe. House prices reach up to 300,000 euros per square meter. Between July and August Porto Cervo's square, fashion boutiques and above all the yachts and sail boats host celebrities and VIPs, filling newspapers with summer gossip.

Porto Cervo is today the symbol of the Costa Smeralda, of luxury tourism and VIPs, of trendy pubs, restaurants and yachts, as well as privileged place of encounters of the international jetsetters.

The famous Piazzetta and the small streets that wind through the centre of the town are full of boutiques and jewellers of the most prestigious names; the architecture reflects the typical structures of Galluraand the seemingly simple buildings conceal


MORTORIO ISLAND

Home to rare species such as Audouin's gull, the peregrine falcon and a small colony of little egrets (Egretta garzetta), the Mortorio island, to the south-east of the Maddalena Archipelago, less than two miles from the coast between Porto Rotondo and Porto Cervo, facing Cala di Volpe, belongs to the "Maddalena National Park" to protect its fragile environment.

The island, composed of granite rock and uninhabited, has a hilly terrain, reaching 77 m asl.

Its interior is clothed in low vegetation, mainly Mediterranean shrubs and broom, while the coast has several beautiful sandy coves and inlets among the seacarved rocks.

Access is allowed on the larger south-western beach, with its beautiful emerald waters.





The archipelago of La Maddalena, off the Costa Smeralda, is a quiet place or turquoise lagoons, deserted islands and the most heavenly beaches in Sardinia, with barely a footprint to spoil them.

In the translucent seas of the La Maddalena archipelago, you're in another world. It doesn't feel like the Mediterranean here. It feels like a more rugged version of the Carribean. Suspended between Sardinia and Corsica, this scatter of seven large islands and 55 tiny "isolotti" has some of the most spectacular beaches in Italy, and some of the cleanest and clearest water.

But it is only recently that these islands have begun to discover tourism, and in turn to be discovered by tourists. La Maddalena - the main island, where all but five per cent of the archipelago's 10,000 inhabitants live - was insulated from the need to make much of a living out of visitors by the presence of a huge NATO naval base. This provided jobs for hundreds of maddalenini, both directly on the base and indirectly in the form of dollar-rich US officers and seamen looking for places to eat and drink - until it closed in 2008. The archipelago has been well-known to the Costa Smeralda yacht set for a while, who sails out to the heavenly turquoise lagoons like the Porto della Madonna, and the islands' deserted beaches only accessible by boat, and occasionally stop for lunch at one of the islands' waterside trattorias; and there are a few small hotels, pensionis and modest resorts catering to a mainly Italian clientele. So, visitors to



La Maddalena will find a certain friendliness and eagerness to please among restaurateurs, shop owners and hoteliers, along with a command of English unusual in Italy, bred by decades of coexistence with the US navy.

What first strikes you about the town of La Maddalena is the feeling it shares with certain other historically significant Mediterranean ports, like Valletta or Mahón, of being a place of transit, its character formed as much by the contacts it has made over the centuries as by the country it happens to be attached to. But this limbo status is common to the whole archipelago.

This has a lot to do with history. The first inhabitants of

the islands in modern times were Corsican shepherds who crossed the dangerous Strait of Bonifacio with their herds, in search of pasture that was not subject to taxation or competition from cropping farmers. When the 1720 Treaty of The Hague assigned Sardinia to the House of Savoy, the Maddalena archipelago was simply forgotten, and the island's uncertain territorial status made them a smugglers' paradise.







CAPRERA ISLAND







Caprera is a small island off the coast of Sardinia, Italy, located in the Maddalena archipelago.[1]

In the area of La Maddalena island in the Strait of Bonifacio, it is a tourist destination and is famous as the place to which Giuseppe Garibaldi retired from 1854 until his death in 1882.

This island has been declared a natural reserve for the particular species of seabirds living on it (royal seagull, cormorant and peregrine falcon). The island's name is linked to that of Giuseppe Garibaldi, an Italian patriot and fighter who lived in the 19th century and was one of the fathers of the Italian independence. He bought the island in 1855 and died there in 1882. His house is now a museum and a memorial chapel and the island itself is a national monument. Caprera is linked to La Maddalena island by a 600-meter-long causeway.

The island was probably given its name because of the numerous wild goats living on it (capra means "goat" in Italian).

It is the second largest island in the archipelago and has a surface of 15.7 km2 (6.1 sq mi) and 45 km (28 mi) of coastline. Monte Tejalone is the highest point (212 m). On the south-western side there is a very important sailing center and the many coves and anchorages which can be found along the coastline make the landing easy.

Many remains of Roman cargo ships as well as of the boat of Garibaldi were found there. After the Roman occupation, Caprera remained deserted for centuries before being inhabited by groups of shepherds. Later in 1855 Garibaldi decided to settle there and planted the first trees of the blooming pinewood which covers the island today. A century after Garibaldi's death the island was freed from the numerous existing military restrictions and is now completely open to the public.
